MATERIALS & METHODS


The research concludes that the coronavirus has an effect on students'

RESULT AND DISCUSSION


Following the online survey, the results are as follows.

Do you Think Covid-19 Impact on Education?




According to our survey, more than 90 per cent of students think that Lockdown has had a huge impact on education, very few students feel that it has any effect and some students are neutral.


How do you see the lockdown period of Covid-19.



Does this lockdown have a positive impact on students?





Most of the students think that the exam should be done online so that the coronavirus infection is reduced. Some students think that the exam should be taken after the lockdown, but the exam should not be canceled.


which one is effective learning tool in lockdown period?



More than 50% of the students think that it would be more beneficial for the college professors to take hours online because the students have become accustomed to teaching their professors, the students can


absorb it well. There are a lot of teaching mediums available online but students do not feel the effect well.

Students are most affected class during lockdown period.




